Sheriff's Office

The Eau Claire County Sheriff's Office is a full-service law enforcement agency. The Office seeks to provide a secure environment professionally and efficiently and to foster positive relationships within the community.

2022 Accomplishments

Security Services (Program Areas: Detention of Inmates including Huber and Courthouse Security)

- Hired 7 correctional officers in 2022. Although this reduced the number of order-ins that staff would need to fill, we still struggled to reach full-staff throughout the year ending 2022 with 13 vacancies remaining. In 2022 we kept order-ins down totaling 37. This is similar to the 50 order-ins in 2020 and 61 order-ins in 2021. We maintained much improvement from previous years with order-in numbers ranging 100-700.
- Despite the struggle to reach full staff we were able to manage our overtime expenses while still going through a pandemic. In 2022 our OT in Security Services was \$306,876; 2021 came in at \$253,128 meanwhile 2020 at \$245,804. We continue to make great strides in this budgeted area while improving morale within the division.
- We continue to utilize video conferences for court related hearings for cost savings when applicable.
- Maintained a contract with the State Department of Health Services to initiate "treatment to competency" for those in custody and court ordered to Mendota Mental Health. Treatment, medication, and counseling begin at the Jail, greatly improving the service delivery model. Also continued to update and monitor suicide watch procedures.
- Continued participation with the Stepping Up Initiative being led by the Department of Human Services to respond to re-entry service needs of jail residents.
- Added 2 social workers from Department of Human Services to work in the jail. Both trained in crisis response. One focuses on the short-term or urgent needs of jail residents, the other focuses on long-term issues for jail residents.
- Continued to work with the County Board and the Wisconsin Legislature to research the ability for counties to classify Correctional Officers as Protective Status under the Wisconsin Retirement System.
- Eau Claire County Jail teamed up with Chippewa Valley Votes to increase voting opportunities within the jail. We hosted our 3rd On-site Voter's Registration event for inmates and the first voter education event.
- Huber operations suspended entirely in 2021 due to COVID-19. Working on future plans to open when staffing allows.

Field Services (Program Areas: Response to Crime & Community Caretaking, Civil Process, Investigations, West Central Drug Task Force, Traffic Control and Enforcement)

- Creation of Mental Health Liaison in partnership with DHS. This mental health professional works within the Field Services Division of the Sheriff's Office and responds to active crisis within the community. This position also follows up with those who experienced a crisis. The position is limited to weekdays and eight hours per day.
- A Detective position was added and immediately established a caseload to include general crimes and assistance to Child Protective Services. The Detectives work many complicated and urgent investigations that are sensitive within our community.
- The Sheriff's Office continues to work alongside the Health Department for the Prescription Drug Take Back program. This effort takes unused and unwanted medications to proper disposal. Often, these medications end up in the wrong hands which lead to tragic incidents.
- The Office has added a 3D Scanner. This equipment "maps" and documents scenes to included crimes and crash reconstruction. The scanner replaces hours of manual calculations and analysis.
- Continued participation with CART (Child Abduction Response Team) involving law enforcement from Eau Claire County Sheriff's Office, Eau Claire Police, Altoona Police, University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire Police, Fire and Rescue, Juvenile Intake, Human Services, School Officials, Probation and Parole, a Sex Offender Specialist, Communication Center, a blood hound, Victim Services, media, Mayo Hospital, Red Cross, DCI, FBI, Student Transit and the District Attorney's Office.
- The Eau Claire County Regional Tactical Team responded to six calls for service. The multiple agency unit has the resources and abilities to respond and manage all high- risk operations while reducing overtime for one single agency in the event of a crisis.
- Continued participation with the Drug Endangered Children Committee (DEC) to address the impact that drugs have in our community and the significant damage children exposed to dangerous drug environments experience.
- The West Central Drug Task Force, comprised of 16 member agencies, continues to offer specialized enforcement tools, personnel and training to assist agencies in securing evidence for prosecution in drug cases as well as with property thefts, robberies and assaults
- Continue to work closely with the Department of Transportation and the Highway Department to enhance public safety on the Highways. Enhancements include permanent message boards, ramp gates and reroute plans.
- The Office has been working closely with the Parks and Forest Department on numerous concerns within the community. There have been health and safety issues that negatively impact the quality and promotion of our public areas.
- Continued providing advanced training to staff in areas of Mental Health, Crisis Intervention, De-Escalation techniques, and active threat response within our schools, among others.
 - Continued providing community, school, and county level presentations and education in the areas of drug use, response to active threats, and drug endangered children

Additional Projects/Activities

- Large variety of PR events to include: Coffee with a Cop, local parades like Clearwater Holiday parade, Honor Guard events, Altoona Highschool Graduation, and career fairs
- Continued participation in the Evidence Based Decision Making (EBDM) initiative. Staff serve on subcommittees assisting with building state-wide policies for the criminal justice system.
- Staff training initiatives include ongoing development of in-house programs for all staff to decrease costs. Topics addressed meet the criteria for ensuring law enforcement officers and correctional officers maintain certifications.
- The agency implemented mandatory wellness visits for all line staff to include mental health education for supervisors
- We again were able to help a smaller number of children through our Kids N’ Cops program this year. We worked in collaboration with a couple of smaller agencies and families to bring some Christmas gifts and joy to some families in need.
- The Bailiffs implemented courthouse security walks to ensure the safety and awareness of the courthouse.
- We continued to serve several children in the community with our Drug Endangered Children program. We continue to see additional donations from members and businesses in our community to fund this program. In 2022 we received over \$5000 in donations to the DEC program giving us many abilities to help out children in need.
- Participated with Marshfield Clinic, the Department of Justice and the Alliance for Substance Abuse Prevention in the National Drug Take Back initiative to reduce the amount of unneeded, expired and unused prescription drugs.
- Continued participation in VINE (Victim Information and Notification Everyday) service through which victims of crime, concerned community members, law enforcement and others can use the phone or Internet to search for information regarding an offender’s custody status.
- Continued participation with Wisconsin Crime Alert Network (WCAN) which allows law enforcement agencies to send out crime alert bulletins to businesses and the public about crime which may affect them.
- Obtained grant dollars for equipment, training, and special operations such as the West Central Drug Task Force and the State Criminal Alien Assistance Program (SCAAP). Includes grants for fighting methamphetamine and heroin.
- Worked with Crime Stoppers throughout the year gathering information for cases.
- Guest Speaking Engagements to include the following: Accountable Drivers Education, CVTC-EC North and Altoona High Schools for Criminal Justice Class

2023 Future Opportunities

- Methamphetamine (Meth) continues to plague our community and criminal justice system. Meth Response Committee needs to continue focus on Community Outreach/Awareness, Court System Response, and Post Disposition Response. The number of jail bed days associated with Meth has surpassed those with OWI convictions and is a major driver of the jail population increase.
- Ongoing work with the Criminal Justice Collaborating Council and the Evidence Based Decision Making Work group to implement system changes through the collection of data that is informing and helping to shape our judicial system.
- Jail population experiencing a complex array of medical and mental health needs of inmates among Covid-19 challenges.
- Recruitment and retention of qualified personnel will continue to be challenging, especially in the current environment. The ongoing weekly reports of unprovoked violence directed towards officers does not make it the career choice it once was. Coupled with turnover resulting from retirements, employees transitioning to new careers, and general staff shortages, keeping the level of current services could be difficult.
- Sheriff's Office remains interested in the county-wide study being conducted related to storage as the department has needs in this area and has expressed this concern for many years.
- Need for additional staff in all areas of the Sheriff's Office operations will continue to be a challenge. Sheriff's Office review indicates staffing deficiency in all Divisions. We continue to tell our story to our committee and others of this need.
- Cross train administrative staff on various functions to better assist Field and Security Services, while accommodating the changes in business due to COVID-19.
- The Drug Endangered Children program continues to grow and supply much needed items to the community.
- ALICE Training continues to grow not only within the building but with businesses in the County we will continue in person training as permitted.
- Regional collaboration with Tactical and Special Events Team
- Honor Guard active for conferences, graduations, sporting events, funerals
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- Federal and State Grants received for OT and equipment to improve operations.
- Department Awards issued to employees for Valor, Merit, and Lifesaving
- Detectives continue to handle heavy individual caseloads consisting of felony child abuse, sexual assault, fraud, burglary, child protective services investigations, narcotics, and fraud.

RESPONSE TO CRIME AND COMMUNITY CARETAKING

Crime & Community Caretaking: The Eau Claire Sheriff's Office provides a complete range of public safety and quality of life services to the county including, but not limited to, the following: criminal investigation and apprehension; preventative patrol; emergency response (fire & EMS); disaster response and preparedness; large event security; dispute mediation; building escorts; civil disorder; and other duties as requested by the citizens.

SWAT: The Sheriff's Office Tactical team referred to as SWAT, or Special Weapons and Tactics, is a multiple agency team that is comprised of deputies from various divisions of the Sheriff's Office, Altoona Police, Chippewa Falls Police, Bloomer Police, Chippewa County, Menomonie Police Department, Dunn County, and Wisconsin State Patrol. In addition, there is a correctional officer used as the communication link for operations. The team is supported medically by the Chippewa Fire District. This team works alongside deputies and correctional officers who are assigned to the Negotiations Team. The team responds to high-risk situations where better-trained and equipped personnel may be needed to safely resolve the incident. These incidents may be high-risk warrants, personal warrants, VIP protection, hostage situations, officer/citizen rescue, barricaded situations, manhunts, or any event where more skilled training is required. The team is comprised of a tactical commander and three team leaders that provide skilled training on a monthly basis and develop operational plans for responses. The Regional Team is a member of the Aligned Law Enforcement Response Network. This group is funded, equipped, and trained to respond to large scale incidents around the State.

Also includes transportation of prisoners and mental subjects to and from the courts and to and from secure institutions.

Housing of Huber inmates includes random urine testing and Electronic Monitoring.

CIRCUIT COURT & COURTHOUSE SECURITY

Wisconsin statute 59.27(3) mandates that the sheriff shall: “attend upon the circuit court held in the sheriff’s county during its session”. Program area provides security for the circuit court judges, court commissioner and for courthouse departments. Deputies monitor proceedings by providing security while court is in session, respond to all calls for service and emergencies within the courthouse, transport “in-custody” persons between the jail and courtrooms, assist the Clerk of Courts Office with escorting persons who appear in court to ensure documents are signed when needed, patrol the courthouse when time allows, make arrests for warrants and other criminal offenses within the courthouse and surrounding area, assist the Treasurer’s Office with bank deposits, and other duties as needed.

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INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES

General Investigative: Follow up investigations of reported crimes including collection of evidence, testifying in court, and providing the victim with progress reports on the status of the investigation. Also includes project management for the West Central Drug Task Force, a multi-agency Drug Unit focusing on narcotics investigations.

West Central Drug Task Force: The West Central Drug Task Force is a cooperative effort made up of multiple law enforcement agencies from six area counties, the intent of which is to identify individuals involved in the manufacture, distribution or sale of illicit drugs as well as the illegal diversion of prescription medication. Criminal activity commonly associated with drug crimes such as illegal possession of firearms, burglary and theft is also addressed. Under a functioning Memorandum of Understanding signed by all agency members of the Task Force, resources such as personnel, equipment, and economic resources can be targeted to particular criminal problems within the Task Force area.
